MCG Officer's Reports 2022

Finally, we are getting back to normal after the Covid19 pandemic. Traditionally, we hold our AGM in the spring of each year but last year's AGM had to be held in September.

Please find herein the reports of the various club officers. Many are for the period Sep 2021 to March 2022 though the financial reports are for the 2021 calendar year.

Secretary's report

Bill Chadwick writes:

At last, the Covid pandemic seems to be behind us. Folk are back enjoying caving and digging together and socialising at member's weekends. Membership numbers for 2022 are little changed from 2021.

The cottage has been further spruced up with a fresh paint job to all three bunk rooms. Many thanks to all the folk who helped with that in October. Jason continues to put in a sterling effort with improvements and repairs for us – many thanks Jason.

Mark has been busy with several new members and we have made up some new Full members. Mark's efforts in this area are most important in maintaining the youth and vigour of the MCG – thankyou Mark.

I sense that guest bookings are on the increase again which is good for our income. You will see from Tom's report though that we are still running at a deficit. We won't be able to do that for long, especially with increases to our energy costs. We will most likely have to increase our fees very soon. Many thanks to Tom for his hard work on our accounts and the examiners Peat and Linda for their checking of them.

Dave has made great strides re-organising the library and has constructed a fine new central island that can be used for the storage and study of books and surveys. My special thanks go to Dave for taking our committee and trustee meeting minutes and preparing draft agendas.

Dan has been minding the tackle in its new location in the shed. Operation from the shed seems to be going well.

We have had several socials and meals organised by Nicola, including a return of the famous MCG Christmas dinner. Nicola is standing down this year and should be assured that we have all been very appreciative of her efforts over the last few difficult years. As I write, we don't have a nomination for Social Secretary for 2022.

I am pleased to announce that Dave Cook has volunteered as Editor for 2022.

At the very start of the 2022, we were pleased to learn that our application to create a Charitable Incorporated Organisation or CIO to replace the existing MCG charity has been approved by the Charity Commission. The work to transfer the assets of the old charity to the CIO is ongoing. Many thanks to Steve Porter and Ben Cooper for their work on this.

Our conversion to a CIO should not affect the day-to-day running of the MCG. The trustees of the CIO replace the previous committee but with the same officer roles and function. To go with our new constitution as a CIO, the trustees have compiled an initial set of rules for the MCG as a CIO.

These mostly just affirm what have been our common operating practices over the last few years. We still have some work to do if we are to admit under 18s as MCG members.

Treasurer's report

This report covers the calendar year 2021.

Tom Harrison writes:

Summary

2021 brought a surplus of £6,291, primarily due to receipt of the final Covid Grants of £12,500. Our income is still nearly £3,000 lower than in 2019, once the grants are discounted and subs adjusted for the relevant year.

£39,500 has now been received in covid grants since 1/1/2020.

Of this money, £16,387 has been spent on improvements to the cottage and £685 on specific covid related items. Maintenance and small upgrades are approximately £1,500.

With income being lower by approximately £6,000 over the 2 years, we have so far "spent" about £24,600 of the grant, leaving £14,900 left.

I also applied for a national lottery 'return to play' grant. From this we received £2,500, which was used by our cottage warden towards the conversion of the tackle store into a separate shower, toilet, and washbasin. £3,310 was spent on this.

Costs, as I am sure you are all know, are rising, and while we have significant reserves, I expect the club to run with a deficit for the next few years. While there has been more use of the cottage, bed nights haven't recovered from pre covid numbers and it appears that more are coming to use the cottage for the day and not staying.

As mentioned in the detailed notes below, when not staying, please consider a donation of a quid or two, to help towards the ever increasing, lighting/heating/water/rates and other ongoing cottage costs.

In the longer term, I hope that the investment that we have continued to make in the cottage will increase both membership numbers and cottage use, while also making the facilities more suitable for guest groups. This should help to 'balance the books' and to meet our charitable objectives.

For 2021 I have also reformatted the financial report. I hope that this revised version is easy to read and comprehensible, but I welcome any feedback! Notes for each category follows the report.

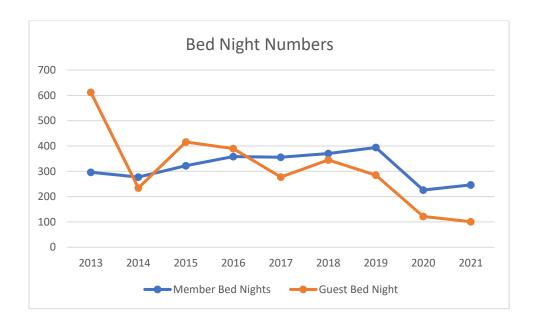

Notes

Income

A – Member's Bed Nights are up on the year as lockdowns ended and restrictions eased. This allowed both more to visit the cottage and more to stay, as our restrictions on number of cottage users ceased. Bed nights have started to recover from the 2020 low but are still around 60% of 2019's numbers with bed night income £740 lower than that year.

B – Guest use of the cottage resumed in summer 2020. Guest bed nights are almost 1/3rd of the numbers in 2019, with guest bed night income £1,109 lower.



C – Day use donations are those collected from cash in the shower donation's box and donations entered on the card payment machine as such. These increased as more came to use the cottage but didn't stay. Thanks to all who contributed in this way.

If you are coming to use the cottage but do not stay the night, please consider a donation of a couple quid which helps to cover the ever increasing, lighting, heating, water, business rates and other ongoing cottage costs.

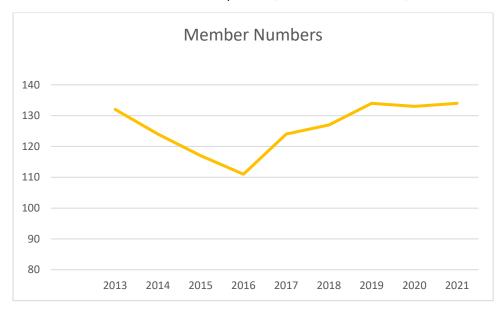
D – Includes some cash for bed nights in 2020 which were paid for in 2021 and £180 for deposits for stays in 2022.

E – Any donations received designated for Cottage use only. Does not include grant money. There are currently £2,310.98 of cash funds designated specifically for cottage use.

F – Includes Key Fob deposits and £7 for the 1st use of the EV Charger. The current charge for charging is 30p per kWh. Usage can be determined by checking the meters inside the porch and recording a before and after figure.

G – Subscriptions for membership are mostly received in December and January, therefore the annual accounts to year end, do not accurately reflect the amount collected for the 'year's' memberships.





H – Any cash or card donations received at the member's weekend social events.

I – Any other generic cash or card donations received.

 ${f J}$ – Interest received on our cash savings (negligible) and dividend income received from the Investments / "other monetary assets."

K – Includes £15,000 of grants, deposits for kit use (refundable for new members), and cash for attendance of the AGM and/or Christmas dinners. AGM/Christmas dinner income should equal AGM/Christmas Dinner costs. For 2021 no AGM dinner was held.

 ${f L}$ – BCA membership subs collected by the MCG.

M – Any other income received for a restricted purpose.

N – Cottage and Cottage contents insurance.

O - Electricity costs - £471.51.

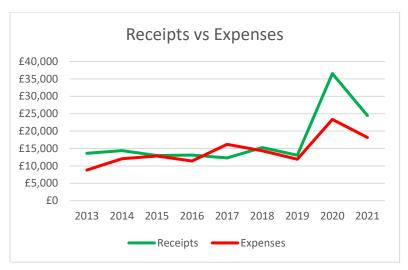

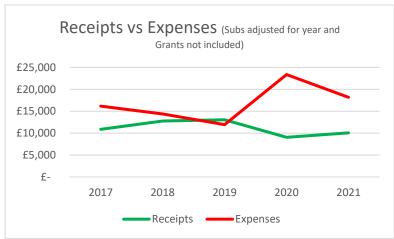
